Public Hearing Presentation Rezoning of Land on Mays Chapel

Fact: There will be a **<u>Drop</u>** in adjacent, adjoining, and other community residential property value if rezoned.

Confirmed by numerous real estate agents; most have outlined that the degree of
reduction is unknown as it depends on what is on the light industrial zoned property. All agree
that debris and openly stored waste could result in an inability to even sell land in the area.

Fact: There is waste and trash being moved to 1506 Mays Chapel from 176 Rocky Hills Road, yet both properties are in violation of land misuse by Planning Boards of Pittsboro and Chatham County

- Dumping at Rocky Hills has been in process for 7+ years with repeated offenses. This is known and public from the Pittsboro Planning Board and Chatham County Waste Management. There have been complaints, visit sites and violations repeatedly since mid 2010. A final violation was issued in early February, which outlined movement of debris and waste to a "permitted facility" (with proof of receipts). Dumping of this debris and trash began at 1506 Mays Chapel Road in February and continues today.
- A notice of violation of land misuse was issued by Chatham County Planning Board in March.
- The latest depositing of debris and waste occurred on 1506 Mays Chapel during the last week and weekend.

Fact: trash, debris and waste is detrimental if allowed on residential or light industrial zoned properties

- Dumping of trash and debris will result in rodents, increased stray animals, all of which cost increased services such as animal control, waste management, and others
- Waste causes Distasteful appearance of property
- Waste increases Disease potential from insect breeding
- Waste generates Odors

The Chatham County Strategic Plan does not call waste to be allowed to be improperly stored and such use of land is in direct conflict to the expected outcomes of this plan. In addition, reduction of property values is not a goal nor is any activity that promotes the reduction of property values.

Allowing this to happen on another location in Chatham County in just plain wrong, please do not rezone this land.

Dear Sir or Madam,

I would like to formally oppose the general use rezoning on Parcel 61829, located at 17570 NC HWY 902, from R1-Residental to IL- Industrial in the Bear Creek Township.

My grandfather originally built the building to be used as a convenience store adjacent to his own property. When he sold it, he did not think it would be used as a laboratory that used dangerous chemicals. In the past, effluent from the lab was discharged into a neighboring pond causing contamination of the pond and surrounding land. The following chemicals were detected: Radioactive Arsenic, Mercury and Heavy metals. An extensive cleanup was required and this is documented in a book available in the Goldson Public Library.

As a result of the contamination, neighbors had to discontinue using their well and hook-up to county water.

Currently, all lab waste water is supposed to be drained into a holding tank and inspected monthly. An order by Chatham County Public Health Department requires that no lab waste be discharged into the septic system and it is for residential waste only. No lab sinks may discharge into the system, please see attached. He is required to maintain a contract with a certified subsurface operator.

For all of these reasons, I would request that the property is not rezoned as light industrial.

its predecessor at that location, the testing methods it uses are different and produce very little waste.

"We haven't exceeded more than five gallons of waste a day since we opened," Stewart said. She added that the waste is now stored in 50gallon drums that are professionally removed from the property.

After being contacted by the DWM, Stewart said the firm hired an environmental engineering company — Armstrong Environmental Inc. — to help analyze the risk on the property and establish a plan for repairing any damage caused by the previous tenants.

"We requested their watchful eye to make sure we don't do anything harmful to the environment." Stewart said.

The pipe which transported waste to the nearby farm pond was capped in January 2004, according to Coleman's report. Since the pond is not on the property owned by Carolina Analytical, Stewart said the laboratory would not pay Armstrong to test or report on the pond.

"Carolina Analytical never put waste into that pond," Stewart said. "We are not paying them to do anything with that pond."

The pond is on land owned by Chester Beavers, a part owner of Carolina Analytical. The *Chapel Hill Herald* could not reach him for comment.

A report by Armstrong on the extent of the damage done by the hazardous waste is expected in the next few weeks, Akroyd said.

In the meantime, John Hammond, secretary of the Chatham Coalition, a grassroots community group, said he is doing his own investigation.

"As a Ph.D. in biochemistry, I am interested in anyone who capriciously discharges into an area of our county," Hammond said Monday.

Many people who live near the laboratory site have wells, and some may even rely on well water for their homes, Hammond said, adding that he feels those nearby residents should have been notified about the potential for harm.

"We don't know the quantities that went in, nor how far they migrated," Hammond said. "I want to understand how this could go on so long without regulation."

Their son, Craig, has attended Deep River School since kindergarten and graduated this year. They were looking forward to his attending East Lee Middle School, but their request was turned down due to the overcrowding at East Lee.

Richard Dunn appeared at the Lee County Board of Education meeting Monday to appeal that decision. He spoke during public comment time and said that he hoped out-of-district students already attending Lee County Schools could be "grandfathered" in.

"We would like to continue in Lee County," he told the board. "Craig has excelled in Lee County, participating in the Academically and Intellectually Gifted program. Forcing a child from his known classmates and safe environment doesn't seem to follow the motto of 'No Child Left Behind."

The board, which had previously denied his appeal in a closed meeting, did not comment.

"We are very happy with the education our child got in Lee County," Julie Dunn said later. "It's tough to be uprooted. We love the Lee County school system."

Most of the cost of educating public school students in North Carolina is paid by the state, based on student numbers. For 2005-06, Lee County Schools projects revenues of \$41.5 million in per-pupil funding from the state. That is paid based on enrollment, regardless of where a student lives.

School districts also receive local funding to run the schools, including county appropriations and moneys received from local fines and forfeitures. For 2005-06 operating expenses, Lee County Schools will have about \$12 million in local funding, including about \$11 million from county tax revenue.

In July, the board of education adopted the policy, which allows the district to charge nonresidents tuition equal to the per-pupil local funding residents pay through their local taxes. The district arrived at the dollar figure by dividing the total district enrollment, about 9,200, by the total anticipated local revenue.

"When you have individuals come from beyond the school district — non-residents in attendance — they use the same resources as student residents, but they are not part of the tax base," said district Superintendent Jim McCormick.

The tuition policy does not apply to students who are exempt by state or federal law, such as special education students who come to Lee County because the services they need are not available in their home counties.

McCormick said that he has not granted admission to anyone from out of district for the 2005-06 school year.

Harnett County Schools does not currently charge a nonresident student tuition. Superintendent Dan Honeycutt said there is about an equal number of students going to other school districts from Harnett as there are coming into the district from elsewhere, so "it's a wash," he said.

"We would have been willing to pay tuition, but they didn't mention that," Julie Dunn said. "They said from the first that they were refusing us because of school overcrowding."

When school opens this year, Craig will attend Chatham County's J.S. Waters School in Goldston, which serves students in grades kindergarten through eighth grade.
