

Early in its history, NC was considered the "Rip Van Winkle" State. Now, with all its internet-based resources, it is at the forefront of internet-based genealogy research! The listed websites are mostly FREE resources, and most are Tarheel home-grown!

Massive collection of over 90,000 historic and recent photographs, state government publications, manuscripts, and other resources, covering from colonial times to the 20th century. Content is from the State Archives of North Carolina & the State Library of North Carolina. <u>A must visit website</u>. NOT all collections are searchable. For some, you can only search on index terms (such as county name, date, etc). Collections include:
